

Faculty Qualifications

Review Committee for Thoracic Surgery

Faculty members are a foundational element of graduate medical education. In each program, there must be a sufficient number of faculty members with competence to instruct and supervise all residents/fellows. Faculty members not certified by a member board of the American Board of Medical Specialties (ABMS) or by a certifying board of the American Osteopathic Association (AOA) must adhere to the following program requirements:

Thoracic Surgery (Independent) Programs:

2.8. Faculty Qualifications

Faculty members must have appropriate qualifications in their field and hold appropriate institutional appointments. ^(Core)

2.9. Subspecialty Physician Faculty Members

Subspecialty physician faculty members must have current certification in the subspecialty by the American Board of Thoracic Surgery or the American Osteopathic Board of Surgery, or possess qualifications judged acceptable to the Review Committee. ^(Core)

2.9.a. Any other specialty physician faculty members must have current certification in their specialty by the appropriate American Board of Medical Specialties (ABMS) member board or American Osteopathic Association (AOA) certifying board, or possess qualifications judged acceptable to the Review Committee. ^(Core)

Thoracic Surgery (Integrated) Programs:

2.9. Faculty Qualifications

Faculty members must have appropriate qualifications in their field and hold appropriate institutional appointments. ^(Core)

2.10. Physician Faculty Members

Physician faculty members must have current certification in the specialty by the American Board of Thoracic Surgery or the American Osteopathic Board of Surgery, or possess qualifications judged acceptable to the Review Committee. ^(Core)

Congenital Cardiac Surgery Programs:

2.8. Faculty Qualifications

Faculty members must have appropriate qualifications in their field and hold appropriate institutional appointments. ^(Core)

2.8.a. Faculty members must be appointed for at least two years to ensure continuity in the supervision of fellows. ^(Detail)

2.9. Subspecialty Physician Faculty Members

Subspecialty physician faculty members must have current certification in the subspecialty by the American Board of Thoracic Surgery or possess qualifications judged acceptable to the Review Committee. ^(Core)

[Note that while the Common Program Requirements deem certification by a certifying board of the American Osteopathic Association (AOA) acceptable, there is no AOA board that offers certification in this subspecialty]

2.9.a. Any other specialty physician faculty members must have current certification in their specialty by the appropriate American Board of Medical Specialties (ABMS) member board or American Osteopathic Association (AOA) certifying board, or possess qualifications judged acceptable to the Review Committee. ^(Core)

All physician faculty members who are not currently certified by a member board of the ABMS or by a certifying board of the AOA must be approved by the Review Committee. In such a case, the proposed faculty member's full curriculum vitae must be submitted for review along with a cover letter signed by the program director and the designated institutional official.

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Prior to submission of the Accreditation Data System (ADS) Annual Update, programs should ensure that all faculty certification documentation is complete and accurate in ADS. Each faculty member should have a designated certification status as listed below. With the exception of "Time-unlimited," all other categories of certification should have an original certification date and a recertification date where applicable.

Certification Status Categories in ADS:

R = Re-Certified

O = Time Limited/Initial Currently Valid

L = Certification Lapsed

N = Time-unlimited

M = MOC/CC

C = Osteopathic Continuous Certification (OCC)
